ANALYZING THE DRASTIC AND RECENT SHIFT OF THE EUROPEAN COURT OF HUMAN RIGHTS REGARDING THE PROTECTION OF MIGRANTS' RIGHTS	
RESUMO DO SIMPÓSIO / SYMPOSIUM SUMMARY	
<p>Migratory movements are currently a strong challenge for the entire international community. Specifically, in Europe, the aforementioned flows are exceeding all records. All this explains the numerous lawsuits filed before the European Court of Human Rights as a consequence of controversial State measures, which seek to contain -at almost any price- the arrival of migrants to their territory. Within this context, it takes on special relevance the case <i>Hirsi Jamaa et al. c. Italy</i> as the cited judicial organ ruled in favor of their rights. The initial excitement surrounding this legal process has been maintained over time until a recent judgment put an end to it through the case <i>N. D and N. T. v. Spain</i>. After reading in detail the judicial decision, it is easy to conclude that the court located in Strasbourg has embarked on a sharp and conservative turn according to which human rights move, in this area, into a devastating background. Bearing this in mind, our purpose is to identify this unfortunate change of course. Additionally, our intention is to determine if the mentioned judicial decision is in line with the Spanish domestic norms. To this effect, the internal regulations in the Spanish legal system on which expulsions have been carried out at border crossings will be analyzed. Obviously, within this context, its due constitutional anchorage will be questioned too. All this will be done in accordance with the European Convention on Human Rights and, of course, we will not lose sight of the fact that the European Court of Human Rights has recently opted, in this field, for a conservative approach.</p>
